The word 'gate' appears 418 times in the

bible. Gates are important to us all, either keeping things in or out, making us safe or trapped? The expression 'gate-keeper' is often used to describe someone in control of access to a place or situation.



Our Christian culture describes St. Peter standing at the 'Pearly Gates' into heaven, deciding who can access the final resting place, usually based on earthly behaviours.

St. Margaret's has a newly repainted gate (thank you Glen) and we don't have any 'gate-keepers'. Instead there is always a welcome and a smile for anyone who would like to walk through them! Join us?

John 20: 19-end On that first Easter Day, Mary Magdalene must have been in a state of utter confusion. Had she really seen her Lord in the garden or was her mind playing tricks? She went anyway to tell the disciples about her experience. Fearful and traumatised, they were hiding behind locked doors when Jesus appeared to them too, except for Thomas who was absent.

When they told Thomas later, he refused to believe until eventually, he saw for himself. Not having literally seen Christ, we can still do so if we look around at the goodness of others, even in this cruel world.

FACT FILE: Easter Facts Many people are perplexed by Easter being a movable feast when Christmas is firmly fixed. In fact, Easter Day can be any date between March 22nd and April 25th. How



is this calculated? Easter Sunday always occurs on the first Sunday after the Paschal Full Moon. What is the Paschal Full Moon? This is specifically the first Sunday following the full Moon that occurs on or after the March or spring equinox. Note that the spring equinox date used by the Christian Church is always March 21 to simplify matters - or you can always Google it!

Acts 4: 32-35 These verses give us a summary of what life was like for the earliest Christian company. Body, mind, and spirit were involved; there was no welfare state to care for the needy and sick. They pooled their resources and gave to those in need. The unity of the church is marvellously portrayed in the words "of one heart and soul". This oneness of mind is more striking in view of the growth of the church and the rapid expansion of the Gospel's influence.

On a spiritual level v33 testifies to the effectiveness of their ministry of preaching and witnessing, great grace was upon them.
