FACT FILE- Rural Deans A Deanery is a

geographical area containing several neighbouring churches. The Rural Dean is the missional leader and pastor of a Deanery. Rural Deans are generally also



parish priests who have a specific responsibility for a church or group of churches in their deanery. In ancient times deaneries originally corresponded with the hundreds. "Dean" (Latin decanus) may derive from the custom of dividing a hundred into ten tithings. In medieval times rural deans acted as the diocesan bishop's officers, but archdeacons gradually took over most of their duties. However, the office was revived during the 19th century. John 14 v 8-17 We are in the last days before Christ's crucifixion and he is saying a number of things that, at that time, the Disciples don't understand. Jesus talks about his Father and the Disciples want to know about him. Jesus doesn't answer as if he is a separate entity. He says that by knowing him you know the Father.
