'Somewhere over the rainbow, Skies are blue And the

dreams that you dare to dream, Really do come true'. I was reminded of this after reading last week's introduction about April showers and the 'Plunk planka plink, plunk planka plink Planka' tongue twister; so many wonderful rainbows recently! There is something magical about a rainbow made from nothing more simple than water vapour and sunlight. So far I have seen four this month. I wonder if there will be more to come? Maybe I should add the rainbow in St Margaret's to make five? How many have you seen so far this month?

ACTS 4 5-12 Peter and John are brought before the rulers of the Temple to give an account of their passionate speech. Peter had told the crowd that by not accepting Jesus they can no longer be considered part of the Israel of God, We now see a Peter reborn in the Holy Spirit, gone is the denier to the strong powerful orator and defender of the faith. In quoting Psalm 118 and applying it to Jesus, Peter argues that the crucified risen Messiah has now become "the head of the corner;" the stone on which the whole structure depends.

FACT FILE: Wool in Crick Woollen cloth was

produced in Crick from early Norman times, probably the worsted type. By 1720 the village had a population of 600. The 1777 Militia List, covering men from 18-45,



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showed there were 46 weavers, 6 wool combers and 2 cordwainers (shoemakers). A hand loom weaver earned £1 weekly (£205.38 today). The Industrial Revolution hit rural weaving badly and by 1800, there was a workhouse in the Derry, funded via a parish rate. The overseers encouraged people to emigrate to America, giving them provisions and money for their passage - cheaper than keeping them here!

John 10: 11-18 In this parable of the Good Shepherd, Jesus makes two predictions. One about his forthcoming death and resurrection..... " I lay down my life only to take it up again....I have authority to lay it down and authority to take it up again." The other prediction is that the good news is not only for the Jewish nation but includes the whole world- - - "I have other sheep not of this sheep pen and I must bring them in also. They too will listen to me and there will be one flock and one shepherd."

What an amazing Saviour!
